Our Simeons and Annas

Some of you will be aware that for many years I worked in our Passionist Parish in London. There was a Primary school attached to the Parish, who were very proud of the fact that they were Passionist, and the school uniform featured very prominently a version of our Passion Sign – a heart surmounted by a cross. I'm not being biased when I say this, but they were genuinely the best school for a long way around, and while other schools were struggling for numbers, they were filled every year. So it was most unusual for me to arrive down there one February morning to hear that ten new arrivals had been admitted mid-year.

Usually new arrivals, who come after the beginning of term, try to slip quietly, unnoticed, into their classes – they tend not to like a lot of attention being focussed on them. But these new arrivals were in the spotlight from the word go. They were given no opportunity to hide away in the background, or to be shy. One might fairly say that they came out of their shells right away – some more quickly than others. (I'm going to apologise now, to save me from having to apologise later!) And their pecking order was instantly established – the first one to arrive straight away started pecking at the others to come out and keep him company. And – I hope this is the last one! – the whole experience of suddenly becoming the centre of everyone's attention didn't seem to knock a feather out of any of them. That's because they actually didn't have any feathers yet! Of course I'm referring to the hatching of 10 little chickens that were the centre of a project the school running on some theme or other. As you can easily imagine, the children – and not a few members of staff – were totally enthralled by the whole event, and I think it's true to say that the new arrivals had an uplifting effect on the whole atmosphere of the school – new life does that!

As it happens I was saying some class-masses in the school during the same week, and as usual I was trying to keep it as light as possible, while at the same time challenging the children to think

around the general themes of mass in general, and the readings in particular. We were discussing practical love as illustrated in respect and kindness towards one another, especially those maybe smaller and less powerful than ourselves. Trying to be topical, and provocative, I asked how many of them had kicked the little chickens that day! Nobody answered – there was an audible gasp and a look of shock in their faces, that the thought could ever have even crossed my mind. Of course they wouldn't dream of doing such a thing – they just wanted to admire and cuddle and feed the new young lives – all supervised, of course.

But it isn't just newly-hatched chickens that need to be appreciated and nurtured. The theme running through all our readings this week is that of being called by God to achieve beyond our own human abilities. Isaiah was too overwhelmed by his own sinfulness to think that God could call him to be his messenger, until he felt the purifying touch of the Lord, after which he couldn't wait to be called – "Here I am, Lord. Send me!" Paul, a persecutor of the early followers of Christ felt his life being turned around by the grace of God, as one born again when nobody expected it. And the early apostles in our Gospel are suddenly called by Jesus at the time they might have least appreciated it – when they'd just had the largest catch of fish they'd ever seen in their lives, a catch that inspired Peter to acknowledge his sinfulness and unworthiness.

The truth is that very often we don't appreciate our own worth, and what the Lord can achieve through us. But that's a mistake that the Lord Himself never makes in our regard. He can see behind the weak and chicken-hearted appearance that we often present, to the genuine goodness and desire to be loving and caring of others that is the true us. It's time for us to come out of our shells (sorry) and really grow as faith-filled followers of Christ.
